APRIL 21, 2020

Moses' Final Days - "Do Not Go Gentle Into the Good Night"

In exploring Moses' response to his immanent death in Torah and Midrash we see that Moses did not "go gentle into the night" but did "rage, rage against the dying of the light". From Moses we learn to meet death with honesty and spiritual equanimity.

HAGAR, RITZPAH AND RACHEL: MOTHER-GRIEF AND BIBLICAL DEATH PRACTICES

An exploration of themes of loss and grief as documented in the stories of Hagar, Ritzpah, the concubine of King Saul and Mother Rachel. From their stories we learn of the dignity and courage we can each bring to our individual losses.

TRANSCENDING TRAUMA: MYTHIC DIMENSIONS OF THE BOOK OF RUTH

Through study, discussion and reflective meditation we will explore the book of Ruth. Through Ruth's story we shall see how we too can transcend trauma and loss in our lives, deal with life's transitions and hear our own calling towards deeper fulfillment.

JUNE 2, 2020

PROPHET SAMUEL, KING SAUL AND THE WITCH OF ENDOR: SPIRITUALISM AND POST-MORTEM COMMUNICATION WITH THE DEAD

An exploration of the Biblical story of King Saul's visit to the Witch of Endor to call up from the dead the spirit of Prophet Samuel. In this Biblical narrative we shall see the ancient Hebrew ambivalence towards communion with spirits in the world beyond, and how this practice of interacting with the the dead was part of Jewish community life.
