Message from Rabbi Allen

This month we celebrate the holiday of Passover. No doubt preparations have already begun – the shopping and list making, inviting guests and making plans, perhaps even some cooking already. As one of



the most widely observed Jewish holidays, Passover affords us a yearly opportunity to appreciate our freedom both on a national and individual level. It is the very ability to be a free and independent person that allows us to live as we wish and, as our tradition teaches so prominently, to ensure that others have the opportunity to do so as well.

April is also National Donate Life Month (https://www.donatelife.net/ndlm/) in which the focus is on organ donation and providing life for others. I am very proud that on my driver's license, directly underneath my photo, two words are written in bright green capital letters - ORGAN DONOR. I was not always an organ donor but after some study about the issue from a secular ethical perspective and also a halakhic (Jewish legal) one, I came to the understanding that it was the correct Jewish decision for me. As Judaism teaches, saving a life and caring for the living is of utmost importance and can even override Shabbat. There are many and varied concerns relating to the proper respect and honor we afford the deceased. Regarding this issue they are juxtaposed to the value of life itself.

In the context of Passover, organ donation perhaps takes on renewed significance. The parallels are too numerous to count. We say, "Let all who are hungry, come and eat!". We donate food in advance of the holiday so that others may have a seder and fulfill the mitzvah of matzah. We count our blessings as a nation and recognize that- *dayenu*- it would have been enough. The examples go on and on.

Each of these examples is based on the notion that our freedoms – indeed our very lives - are not

PASSOVER ...

Kashrut for Pesah

Following is a summary of the decisions of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards (CJLS) of the Rabbinical Assembly pertaining to Passover foods, dishes, and utensils. *Kosher le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your rabbi.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives,

Sell Your Hametz

An integral part of the pre-Passover planning involves the selling of one's *hametz*. The Torah enjoins us to rid ourselves from all *hametz* and utensils which have been used during the course of the year. There is no actual transfer of property. It is purely a symbolic procedure. You allow your *hametz* and utensils to be sold to a non-Jew. In this manner, the Biblical injunction is fulfilled.

In order to facilitate the proceedings, kindly complete the form below and return it to the synagogue office.

I will sell your *hametz* on your behalf and in that way you will fulfill the Torah commandment.

Let me take this opportunity, while well in advance, to wish you and yours an enjoyable and happy Passover.

wheat, barley, oats spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniyot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The CJLS has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example: corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult a member of the clergy for guidance in the use of these products.

PERMITTED FOODS: A. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (These juices are often clarified with *kitniyot* which are **not** listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a *kosher le-Pesah* label); wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

B. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen) require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased during Pesah: milk, butter, juices, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

C. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if **purchased prior to Pesah**: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt; pepper, natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above); milk; butter; cottage cheese; frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives).

D. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a *kosher le-Pesah* label.

MEDICINE: Since *hametz* binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: if the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult the clergy. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah*, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in

which it was absorbed in the utensil. Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

A. *EARTHENWARE* (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

B. *METAL* (wholly made of metal) UTENSILS USED IN FIRE (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

C. OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be put through the self-cleaning cycle according to the manufacturer's instructions. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then two cups of water should be placed inside. Then turn the oven on until one cup of water has boiled away. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot by kashered for Pesah.

D. *GLASSWARE*: Authorities disagree as to the method for kashering drinking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesah, or putting them through a dishwasher.

Glass cookware: There is a difference of opinion as to whether this item must be kashered. One opinion is that it must be

kashered. After a thorough cleansing, there should be water boiled in it, which will overflow the rim. The other opinion is that only a thorough cleansing is required. *Glass bakeware*, like metal bakeware, may not be kashered.

E. *DISHWASHER*: After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.

F. *ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES*: If the parts that come into contact with hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)

G. *TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS*: If used with hametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.

H. *KITCHEN SINK*: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

I. HAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS: Non-Passover dishes, pots, and hametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Scholar in Residence Dr. Melila Hellner-Eshed Saturday morning, April 29, 9 AM (PLEASE NOTE change in service time)

Dr. Melila Hellner-Eshed will deliver the D'var Torah during Shabbat morning in the Dogole Chapel. Following the Torah Service, she will present a lecture *Beit Midrash* (Study Hall) style, in the Fishman-Tobin Auditorium, where we will conclude the service. In order to allow maximum time to learn with Dr. Hellner-Eshed, our services will start that morning at 9 AM, and conclude by noon.

Please note: Dr. Hellner-Eshed will also be speaking at Beth Am Israel on Friday evening, April 28.

Hellner-Eshed lectures on the Zohar and Jewish mysticism in the Hebrew University of Jerusalem's Department of Jewish Thought and teaches in the Revivim Honors Teacher-Training Program in Jewish Studies in the University's Faculty of Humanities. She is also a research fellow at the Shalom Hartman Institute.

For the past two decades, Dr. Hellner-Eshed has been a central figure in various frameworks in the Israeli renaissance of the study of Jewish texts by Israeli adults from all paths of life. At the Shalom Hartman Institute, she initiated and directs the Rabbinic Students Seminar, a program for rabbinic students from all denominations spending a year in Israel and is the coordinator of the Maskilot Program, which provides outstanding female doctoral students with an edge in completing their Ph.D.'s and pursuing their rightful place in Israel's elite circle of Jewish studies academics. Dr. Hellner-Eshed has also served as the co-director of the Hartman Institute's Beit Midrash Program. She has been teaching and working with Jewish communities in North America, Europe and the former Soviet Union for many years.

Dr. Hellner-Eshed is active in 'Sulha' – a reconciliation project that brings together Israelis and Palestinians. Her book, And a River Flows from Eden - On the Language of Mystical Experience in the Zohar, was published by Stanford University Press in 2009. Her most recent book, Seekers of The Face - From the Secrets of the Idra Rabba in the Zohar, was published by Yediot Books in 2016.

Sandra Roberts, founding teacher of the "Paper Clips" Project from Whitwell, Tennessee

Middle school students from the small southeastern Tennessee town of Whitwell created a monument for the Holocaust victims of Nazi Germany. It started in 1998 as a simple 8th-grade project to study other cultures, and then evolved into one gaining worldwide attention. At last count, over 33 million paper clips had been received.

Paper Clips, an award-winning documentary film about the project, was released in 2004. Students from Har Zion and neighboring synagogues will be celebrating their 6th consecutive year visiting the Children's Holocaust Memorial in Whitwell, Tennessee on Sunday, April 30.





Bea Hollander, Director of the Transcending Trauma Project, part of the Council for Relationships Since 1991, the Transcending Trauma Project, as part of Council for Relationships, has conducted 305 in-depth life histories with 98 Holocaust survivors, and their children and grandchildren to better understand coping and adaptation after extreme trauma. The project has produced 1200 hours of interviews which are permanently preserved as digital files. The Phil Wachs and Juliet Spitzer Archive of the Transcending Trauma Project is housed at the US Holocaust Memorial

Museum and is available onsite to the public. In 2015, the archive was given to Yad Vashem and Temple University's Special Collections Research Center.



In 2013, Shonnie Lebovitz came to us with the idea of Sisterhood joining the Jewish Book Council and hosting a week of authors at Har Zion. Since we had no idea what she was talking about we said, "No way, we couldn't possibly take on such a task!" So the next year, Shonnie convinced us we could do it.

The Jane Fishman Grinberg Religious School decided to take a chance with Sisterhood and we joined. We chose authors living nearby to save on expenses since we had no idea what to expect. Much to our surprise, having Ron Balsom, author of *Once We Were Brothers* and *Saving Sophie*, started our road to success for "Open A Book...Open Your Mind" (penned by Charlotte Muchnick).

Since our humble beginnings, we have attended three Jewish Book Club Conferences, sometimes sleeping three in a room. The conference includes six two-hour sessions over three days with 300 authors having two minutes to give their *shpiel* to entice us to invite them to Har Zion. Imagine sitting and listening for two hours to 50 authors – cooking ones, singing ones, funny ones, smart ones, and some we are not sure what they are! And then we return home to Har Zion. Sheila and I bite our lips and wring our hands hoping we chose the right mix of authors. As we listen to the authors we make notes: yes, no, maybe. We use our own scientific system to tag the authors. Our only financial responsibility is transportation and lodging for each. We never pay an honorarium.

In the past three years, we were proud to present such great authors as Pam Jenoff, Martin Greenfield, Shulem Deen, Rabbi Harold Kushner, Dr. Dan Gottlieb and Jane Weitzman.
