Message from Rabbi Scott Rosenberg

Throughout November, members of the Har Zion Temple community will focus in four different ways we can "Talk Turkey."

The first Shabbat of November is Parshat Noah, the story of Noah, the flood,



and the rescue of the animals. I know that that week all of the families in the Noreen Cook Center for Early Childhood Education as well as the students in the Jane Fishman Grinberg Religious School will talk about different aspects of our responsibility towards the animals with whom we share the earth. And while the turkey was not a featured animal on Noah's Ark (partially because it is native to North America) the turkey is on our minds throughout November given the focus that our American culture places on turkey during the Thanksgiving holiday at the end of the month.

During the second week of November, I hope all of us will be taking our civic responsibility seriously and exercising our right to vote in the Presidential elections. We all know how embattled the campaign up until the election has been. Our two Presidential candidates, Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump (names listed in alphabetical order) have elicited deep emotional responses from our community. No matter which candidate you support, the issues are pronounced and emotions run deep. Our responsibility as Americans is to educate ourselves on the issues and vote for the candidate we feel will best represent your thinking in Washington and beyond. November 8 is a day America will be talking turkey and I can't urge you enough to be a part of that conversation.





We do so with because we hold on to the belief that being literate in basic Hebrew will enable the learner to access levels of understanding of Jewish text unattainable in translation and will empower them to be more functionally literate in the practices of Jewish life both at home and in the synagogue. Of course one of the great debates in Hebrew instruction today is whether we should be teaching our students to communicate in modern Hebrew with their Israeli counterparts or whether we continue to teach traditional literacy of text and prayer. Ideally, we would teach both but sadly, within the time restraints that govern our busy lives we must make this choice. At JFGRS the decision has been made to continue to provide all of our students with a solid foundation in site reading and the ability to decode and understand traditional sources they will encounter in synagogue and at home.

With that decision made we must then design a program that affords us every opportunity to maximize the learning potential. To that end, we will be creating additional smaller reading groups within each grade. These reading groups will be more homogeneously leveled so that students with similar levels of language acquisition will be learning alongside each other. In the earliest years (k-2) we have dedicated an extra period of instruction to build a more solid footing upon which to build in future years. And finally, we have restructured our staff instruction to create a dedicated cadre of Hebrew language instructors who will work with multiple groups throughout the week rather than have one teacher responsible for the Hebraic and Judaic content of each group.

In the coming weeks and months we will be addressing the content of the Hebrew language curriculum to align it with our current goals. We will establish measurable and attainable outcomes for the classes and individual students and begin to develop formative and summative assessments of student learning to help us to continually better ourselves and continue our progress towards working with the congregation and our parents to educate knowledgeable young Jews who are ready to accept the mantle of leadership in the next generation.





Report on Eshel Avraham, Our Sister Congregation

On September 15, I had the pleasure of attending the 40th anniversary celebration of our sister synagogue, Eshel Avraham in Beer Sheva, Israel. As you know, Har Zion Temple was the first to adopt a Conservative synagogue in Israel and through the years we have continued to raise funds and support their efforts to bring Conservative Judaism to the Negev.

In recent years, Eshel Avraham's Educational Center has become a focus for communal, religious, educational, and cultural life. It serves the needs of a diversified population; singles, families, young people, senior citizens, and new immigrants from Russia and Latin America. Their members welcome new immigrants and help them become absorbed into Israeli society.

Their membership has reached 200 families who not only attend services regularly, but have become involved in welcoming Shabbat at local homes for the aged and also providing food for the needy. There are 200 children in the preschool population, and plans to open a new nursery program in one of the suburbs of Beer Sheva with the help of the municipality. Each year, Eshel Avraham traditionally recognizes the new soldier among the children of the congregation and maintains contact with them throughout their military service and provides them with spiritual and moral support, especially during holidays.

The mayor of Beer Sheva recognizes the asset of this congregation that helps forge a sense of mutual responsibility and communal care for the diverse population in the city. I truly believe that this congregation is in the forefront of the Conservative movement in the Negev and we should be proud of their accomplishments.
