### Message from Rabbi Rosenberg

In discussing social responsibility the Talmud (Baba Batra 8a) teaches: "If a person resides in town for thirty days, that person is responsible for supporting the soup kitchen; after three months, the charity box; after six months, the



clothing fund; after nine months, the burial fund; and after twelve months, that person is responsible to the repair of the town walls." The Talmud is clear that we, as individuals, have a responsibility to both our neighbors and to the place which we call home, and that our level of investment in both increases over time.

When I read this section of Talmud with a contemporary lens, I, like many, struggle to understand how best to apply this teaching in the global village of our day. As a human being, living in a world where "town" boundaries hold little meaning, how do I express my Jewish social responsibility in ways that matter?

The Shulchan Aruch, a 16th century Jewish legal guide, offers some insight: "The poor of one's city take precedence over the poor of another city. The needy of Israel receive priority over the poor of the Diaspora. Obligations to local resident poor precede those owed to transient poor who have just come into the city. One's impoverished family members come before another poor person. Parents have priority over children (who can support themselves). One's self comes before anyone else (all things being equal)." (Yoreh Deah 251:3)

In thinking about how we should help those in need, reaching out from our personal vantage point and offering help and support to those we encounter on our outbound journey is the Jewish way. We move from ourselves to our family, to our immediate neighbors and then beyond as we seek to make our world a better place.

At Har Zion Temple, we are guided by this thinking in our approach to Jewish social responsibility and acts of *Tzedakah*. We are always (continued on page 3)

### Finding Our Voice

Message from Hazzan Eliot Vogel

Recent studies of the American Jewish community have raised our awareness to the fact that there are significant shifts and changes afoot within every aspect of Jewish life in the US. Movements are growing, movements are shrinking and, while large



numbers are moving away from religious observance, there is an ever-growing number of Jews, both young and old, who are finding new ways to bring spiritual meaning to their lives. As surprising as it may seem to some, history shows that even within our religious lives, Jews are quite used to adapting to change. Musical and cultural influences of all sorts have had an impact on how we pray. To some degree the pace of changes could have once been correlated to the three major branches of Judaism, but this may no longer be the case.

While I am not an expert in the field, I certainly have been attuned to the growth of forms of expression within with the worlds of Jewish liturgy and music. We are witnessing a growth of independent minyanim - largely populated by 20 and 30-somethings, as well as, minyanim influenced by the Jewish Renewal movement. While these are still small in number, their impact is proving significant. Within and across movements there are discernable changes and trends appearing. To be sure, some of these challenge what we would see as the accepted norms of Jewish worship. It is not uncommon to react initially with hostility to that which is different or possibly strange. However, I am quite positive that, almost without exception, once time has distilled the very best in the new practices that are evolving, Jewish prayer communities will incorporate these changes in some fashion.

As you know, since the arrival of our Senior Rabbi, Scott Rosenberg, we have been engaged in a very healthy examination of all aspects of Har Zion Temple's operations and religious practices. Some of these efforts have been quite well-publicized, while some discussions have been taking place in smaller circles. While all would agree that wholesale change is anathema to the health of any religious institution, small degrees of experimentation are not only healthy, but vital. These have already begun, but not large numbers are yet aware of them. In recent months, in discussion with both Rabbi Rosenberg and myself, the Religious Committee has sanctioned the use of musical instruments on Shabbat. This past summer we introduced, on two occasions, an accompanied Kabbalat Shabbat, which was enthusiastically received by most individuals.

What we envision going forward is, beginning with the 6:00 PM Friday evening service on Shabbat Shirah (Janaury 30), to sporadically (perhaps once every four to six weeks) use musical instruments throughout the Kabbalat Shabbat and Ma'ariv services. On those occasions we will also offer an alternative service for those who prefer a more traditional davening. Continuing our discussions with the Religious Committee and members of the congregation we will seek to determine if, and how, the use of instruments enhances (continued on page 10)

Happy 2015! Wow! It's hard to believe how quickly time moves. Although it's our secular New Year, it's still a marker of time's passage. I guess when you're occupied and engaged it seems like time flies by even faster! We at Sisterhood have been extremely busy. Just to look back a little, we had an extremely successful opening barbeque in September with music and singing around a fire pit. Our decorated "Safari in the Sukkah," with help from the preschool and religious school, was enjoyed by all. Debbie and I also hosted visits to our own Sukkot for our "sisters" with Rabbi Allen and Josh Buch respectively. The adult educational series has taken off with about 40 people each week studying and learning together. 


