Message from Rabbi Rosenberg

Each holiday in the Jewish year offers a wellspring of meaning to us. Our major festivals teach lessons through their agricultural themes, their historical realities, as well as through their theological underpinnings. Passover,

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which we will celebrate from April 3-11 this year, for example, celebrates the first harvest, links us to the historical realities of the Exodus from Egypt and theologically orients us towards the themes of freedom and redemption. Most of us are familiar with these themes and we engage with one, two or all of them in our celebration of the holiday. What is nice is that most Jews draw some level of meaning from each of our three major festivals, Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. What about our minor festivals? Interestingly, the same thematic messaging is found in these holidays as well.

Consider Purim, which we celebrate beginning Wednesday evening, March 4. Purim is more than just a fun-filled time for noise and revelry. Purim also teaches some very timely historical and theological lessons.

Watching our world these past months, the events in Europe, South America, Israel and even here in America place us on alert because of increased anti-Semitism. Today, as we all know, America, Europe, South America, Africa and Israel sadly share a common understanding of the evil of terrorism that plagues the Free World. Our world is tense and with cause. Then Purim appears on the calendar, a holiday whose message could not be timelier.

One lesson that emerges from the Megillah is the imperative to fight for one's own defense. Evil people – the spiritual heirs of Haman – are willing to scapegoat the Jews in every age, blaming us for inflation, communism, capitalism, war, peace, or anything else they oppose. Alone among the nations of the world, Israel is the only country whose enemies want to get rid of *(continued on page 3)*

it and its civilians entirely, rather than simply disputing a territorial claim or a particular policy.

The irrational and obsessive nature of anti-Semitism is as true today as it was in the days of Haman. And what brought Haman down was the resolve of the Jews to stand up for themselves and to assert their own interests publicly and without apology. We, too, must recognize what's in our own interest - a vital and democratic State of Israel, a vital and democratic United States of America and for that matter all countries that are proponents of religious tolerance and freedom. The freedom and safety of the world's Jews depends on this.

Now more than ever, is the time for us to learn this critical message of Purim. Now we must stand up and be heard as we promote the ideals of liberty and freedom for all. As we defend our rights as Jews, as citizens of America, as supporters of religious tolerance everywhere and as supporters of Israel to defeat the evil in our world. I hope that this message of Purim is heard clearly by Jews this year, so that we as a community can support each other, and go from strength to greater strength.

Purim may be defined as a minor festival, but its message is major in every sense.



PASSOVER . . .

Kashrut for Pesah

Following is a summary of the decisions of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards (CJLS) of the Rabbinical Assembly pertaining to Passover foods, dishes, and utensils. *Kosher le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your rabbi.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniyot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The CJLS has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example: corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult a member of the clergy for guidance in the use of these products.

PERMITTED FOODS: A. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (These juices are often clarified with *kitniyot* which are **not** listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a *kosher le-Pesah* label); wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

B. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen) require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased during Pesah: milk, butter, juices, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

C. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if **purchased prior to Pesah**: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt; pepper, natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above); milk; butter; cottage cheese; frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives).

D. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a *kosher le-Pesah* label.

MEDICINE: Since *hametz* binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: if the



medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult the clergy. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah*, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil. Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

A. *EARTHENWARE* (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

B. *METAL* (wholly made of metal) UTENSILS USED IN FIRE (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

C. OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be put through the self-cleaning cycle according to the manufacturer's instructions. Continuous (continued on page 5)

cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then two cups of water should be placed inside. Then turn the oven on until one cup of water has boiled away. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot by kashered for Pesah.

D. *GLASSWARE*: Authorities disagree as to the method for kashering drinking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesah, or putting them through a dishwasher.

Glass cookware: There is a difference of opinion as to whether this item must be kashered. One opinion is that it must be kashered. After a thorough cleansing, there should be water boiled in it, which will overflow the rim. The other opinion is that only a thorough cleansing is required. *Glass bakeware*, like metal bakeware, may not be kashered.

E. *DISHWASHER*: After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.

F. *ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES*: If the parts that come into contact with hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)

G. *TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS*: If used with hametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.

H. *KITCHEN SINK*: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

I. *HAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS*: Non-Passover dishes, pots, and hametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

The Torah enjoins us to rid ourselves from all *hametz* and utensils which have been used during the course of the year. There is no actual transfer of property. It is purely a symbolic procedure. You allow your *hametz* and utensils to be sold to a non-Jew. In this manner, the Biblical injunction is fulfilled.

In order to facilitate the proceedings, kindly complete the form below and return it to the synagogue office.

I will sell your *hametz* on your behalf and in that way you will fulfill the Torah commandment.

Let me take this opportunity, while well in advance, to wish you and yours an enjoyable and happy Passover.

The Intersection of Joy and Giving

Messsage from **Rabbi Nogah Marshall**, Educational Director

It's very easy to be caught up in the celebratory culture of Purim. We have every reason to be joyful. Not every day do the good guys triumph over evil. So



let's drink and eat, be merry, dress up, shake those groggers, and perform our Purim parodies. But even in our unlimited joy there is a recognition. It's not just about us, rather, we have an obligation to those around us. Joy is not selfish. Joy is to be shared and distributed. Sometimes the act of giving is more heart-warming and joyful than that of receiving.

Thus on Purim there is a Jewish imperative of *Matanot Levyonim*, distributing gifts to the poor. We have the potential to bring salvation and redemption. We have within us the resources to make life better for a lot of people.

As part of our ROUTE 613 program we offer a course called, 'Mitzvah.' In this class, taught by Karen Kripke, our students engage Jewish texts about *tikkun olam* (fixing the world) *gemilut hasadim* (acts of loving kindness) and *mitzvah*, in helping to solve conflicts, tensions, and inequalities. After each session, our students commit to a specific hands-on pragmatic project/solution that benefits both Har Zion Temple and the larger world.

For the first part of the year our students learned about Maimonidies, Rambam, and his ladder of Tzedakah/Giving, the eight rungs. In December, our students created Hanukkah gift packages and personal cards that were given to the residents of the Saunders House with love and joy. For Purim, our students will be making delicious sandwiches, with ingredients of love and empathy with a touch of happiness, that will be distributed to a homeless shelter. And of course, we will be creating masks and groggers for the residents of the Saunders House. Our students in the Mitzvah class have truly brought joy and happiness to many members of our greater community, and we are so grateful to them.

The world today is not always kind. There is a lot of pain, hurt, disappointment and frustration. Things seem so out of control. It is so easy to wallow in hopelessness and powerlessness. But along comes Purim and it reminds us about possibility and requirement; we can be both a source and a messenger of joy and goodness.

Join us in celebration for Purim. Join us to listen to the words of the Megillah, scream, shout, celebrate, laugh, and become a partner with our students in our collective statement to pay it forward.

The family that travels with preschoolers should consider this age group's self-centeredness, short attention span and need for movement. Children at age 3 or 4 make good travelers, though. Traveling with this age group does present some challenges. A survival kit helps minimize irritability and crankiness during long hours of driving. Starting at ages three and six, my husband and I started driving to and from Florida two, sometimes, three times a year. On our way to south Florida we would spend a day in Washington D.C., Savannah, Richmond and Jacksonville. We did go to Disney World, but most of the time we visited their grandparents. However if you pack healthy snacks, storybooks, crayons, markers, paper, games and their favorite songs on an i-pod there will be peace.

Saving a Culture from Extinction By Gerald Spector

Three-quarters of a century ago, Nazi Germany, aided and abetted by anti-Semites in other European countries, undertook a program to exterminate the Jewish people and eradicate every vestige of its culture. People, books, paintings, sculptures, music, buildings, anything that might be considered Jewish, were to be burned or otherwise destroyed. Thank God, they did not succeed. Even though six million Jews were killed, our people survived and are flourishing. However, Jewish culture, particularly Yiddish culture, came perilously close to the brink of extinction.

In the 1940s, in the Bronx neighborhood where I was born and raised, nearly everyone spoke Yiddish. Today, most Jews do not speak or understand Yiddish. New York had four major Yiddish secular daily newspapers. Today, only the *Forward* survives on the internet as a Yiddish language daily. Radio programs in Yiddish could be heard around the clock over several stations. Today, Yiddish radio is virtually non-existent. In addition to Second Avenue in Manhattan, (the "Yiddish Broadway") Yiddish theatrical productions could be seen on several stages in the Bronx and Brooklyn. Today, except for an occasional full stage production by the *Folksbiene*, Yiddish theater is rare. Few Jews are conversant with Yiddish literature or are even aware of its broad scope.

The decline of Yiddish culture is not unique to America. Because its founding fathers considered Yiddish to be a language of the Diaspora and desired to quickly assimilate the inrush of immigrants from all over the world into a unified society, the State of Israel actively discouraged the use of Yiddish.

In 1980, a young graduate student embarked on a journey to reverse this trend. On **Wednesday**, **March 18**, the **Har Zion Active Adults Club (HAZAAC)** will present his story and the history and achievements of the unique institution he created that has miraculously managed to preserve and revive what are arguably the two most significant characteristics of Yiddish culture, its language and literature.

This event includes a luncheon and is free for HAZAAC members who have paid annual dues. Everyone else is invited to attend at \$15.00 per person for lunch and program. 

According to Jewish law, every Jew is obligated to give Tzedakah (i.e. charity). It is traditional to give Tzedakah in memory of loved one, when we receive a synagogue honor. or when we have a simha (joyous experience). 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
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
