Message from Rabbi Uri Allen

Avinu Malkeinu - tehei ha-sha'ah ha-zot, sha'at rahamim v'eit ratzon milfanecha.

Our Father our King, may this moment be one of compassion and a time of favor before you.



Friends, over the course of the summer, I was following various news stories of interest as I'm sure you have as well. My attention was drawn to the Presidential election and the conventions. I watched the news from Israel with interest as I always do especially in the realm of religious pluralism and the conversation around the acceptability of more than one way to be Jewish. The Movement for Black Lives Matter was on my mind when they released their platform in August and what that means for all of us who know that until we are all free, none of us are. I watched the Olympics from Rio and the dual nature of that world-wide event. We saw the war in Syria continue, refugees still unsettled and the effects happening across the Middle East and the world. And many other stories of importance to us as Jews and as Americans.

Looking at these events and the state of our world in general, I can't help but feel a tremendous anxiety about what will come next. We seem to find ever-new ways of dividing ourselves into factions, of disagreeing with animosity and exclusion, and bifurcating an already fragmented world. If I'm being completely honest with myself, I'm scared.

I'm scared that we will never be able to find ways to join together again. I'm scared that once strong alliances between organizations, movements, and countries with shared and mutual interest will simply fade away over unsettled disagreements. I'm scared that we have lost the ability to co-exist with things that are different from us.

And so I pray. And especially at this time of year when there is so much hope and promise in our *(continued on page 5)*

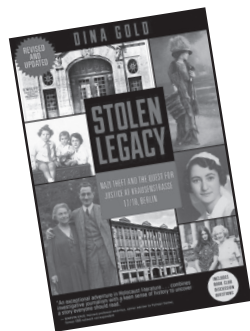
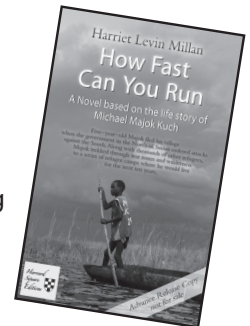
How Fast Can You Run: A Novel Based on the Life of Lost Boy of Sudan Michael Majok Kuch

EDUCATION . . .

Message from Rabbi Shawn

Shalom u'vracha –

Last month I began with a teaching about the Shema itself and this month I would like to continue that discussion, but expand it a little to include the *brachot*/blessings that accompany Shema in the *siddur*. Our sages during the time of the formation of the Mishna (200 CE) also codified the foundation of our *siddur*/prayer book; and when they did they embedded the Shema in a unit that includes several biblical paragraphs and is surrounded by introductory and concluding blessings.

In the blessing we recite just before the Shema, we hear the echo of the original biblical words when it tells us to set these teachings in our hearts, to know and to understand, then we are told to learn and to teach, and finally to preserve and to establish all of the teachings. Once again, we see our pattern of listening/understanding/internalizing the lessons and then teaching them and taking action, just as the first two words of the Shema teach – *Shema Yisrael*.

But more important for today's column is that the biblical paragraph after the Shema is known as *Ve'Ahavta*/You Shall Love and the blessing before the Shema is *Ahava Raba*/A Great Love. The common thread weaving this liturgical unit together is that we are shown love and we reciprocate that love. The loving relationship presented is through the teaching of Torah and the acceptance, internalization of those teachings and then our memorializing the teaching by becoming teachers of Torah to the next generation.

This is a lovely idea at first glance but extremely difficult concept to grasp, and one that will engage each of us in a lifelong pursuit of learning. Equally important is that once again our liturgy instructs us to be in a relationship with something beyond ourselves – whether that is God, the community, or our heritage. It is this relational Judaism that binds us together that I hope we will pursue over the coming months at Har Zion as we join in prayer, study, shared meals, and other communal programming.
