INNOVATION UPDATE FROM ISRAEL IDEAS Sweeter, Healthier Sugar Substitute

With health problems attributed to diet and sugar consumption on the rise, "there is a drive toward finding alternative sweeteners," said Jonathan Hugh, industry manager at ED & F Man, the second-largest sugar company in the world.

An Israeli company appears to be at the forefront of a "revolution" in the sugar industry, with a sweetener product it claims is sweeter and healthier than its much-maligned processed sibling found in many a food product. "Unavoo" was founded and developed at home by Israeli entrepreneur Yuval Maimon, who was diagnosed with diabetes at age 38.

Yom Hashoah Commemoration

Sandra Roberts, founding teacher of the "Paper Clips" Project from Whitwell, Tennessee
Middle school students from the small southeastern Tennessee town of Whitwell created a monument for the Holocaust victims of Nazi Germany. It started in 1998 as a simple 8th-grade project to study other cultures, and then evolved into one gaining worldwide attention.

At last count, over 33 million paper clips had been received.

Paper Clips, an award-winning documentary film about the project, was released in 2004. Students from Har Zion and neighboring synagogues will be celebrating their 6th consecutive year visiting the Children's Holocaust Memorial in Whitwell, Tennessee on Sunday, April 30.



Bea Hollander, Director of the Transcending Trauma Project, part of the Council for Relationships

Since 1991, the Transcending Trauma Project, as part of Council for Relationships, has conducted 305 in-depth life histories with 98 Holocaust survivors, and their children and grandchildren to better understand coping and adaptation after extreme trauma. The project has produced 1200 hours of interviews which are permanently preserved as digital files. The Phil Wachs and Juliet Spitzer Archive of the Transcending Trauma Project is housed at the US Holocaust Memorial Museum and is available onsite to the public.

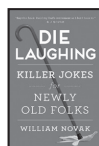
In 2015, the archive was given to Yad Vashem and Temple University's Special Collections Research Center.

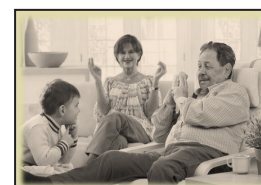


Engaging Jerusalem

Achinoam Nini (known also as Noa), Israeli born of Yemenite origin, raised in the US, resides in Israel with her husband and three children. She is Israel's leading international singer/songwriter, having shared the stage with superstars such as Sting, Pat Metheny, Quincy Jones, Stevie Wonder, Andrea Bocelli and many more, and is Israel's first Good Will Ambassador for FAO, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN.
