THE PASSOVER PROJECT A Jewish Campaign Against Slavery



This year Har Zion Temple joins an every growing number of Jewish institutions across the country bringing awareness to the plight of slaves around the world today. Slavery is not legal anywhere, but it is practiced everywhere. Slavery is found wherever goods or services depend on manual labor. Worldwide, an estimated 21 to 36 million people are trapped and working without pay, under threat of violence. According to the International Labour Organization (ILO), slavery generates about \$150 billion a year in profits for human traffickers.

Each week between now and Pesah, the Festival of Our Freedom, we will present you with materials which will both enhance your seder experience as well as to suggest things that you can do to relieve the plight of slaves in the world today. All faith begins with the act of questioning. From God's first question to Adam and Even in Eden – Ayekah, "Where are you?" – to Abraham's challenge to God concerning Sodom and Gomorrah, to Sarah's exasperating and agonizing question about whether she would ever bear children, to Moses questioning Pharaoh's authority, the Jewish people have always been intoxicated with the art of questioning. It is the privilege of free people to ask questions; this is the birthplace of our compassion and our zeal for justice. Four Questions About Modern Slavery

We start the seder by noticing what is out of the ordinary and then investigating its meaning further. How is this night different from all other nights?

On all other nights, we depend on the exploitation of invisible others for our food, clothing, homes, and more. **Tonight**, we listen to the stories of those who suffer to create the goods we use. We commit to working toward the human rights of all workers.

On all other nights, we have allowed human life to become cheap in the economic quest for the cheapest goods. **Tonight**, we commit to valuing all people, regardless of their race, class, or circumstances.

On all other nights, we have forgotten that poverty, migration, and gender-based violence leave people vulnerable to exploitation, including modern-day slavery. **Tonight**, we commit to taking concrete actions to end this exploitation and its causes.

On all other nights, we have forgotten to seek wisdom among those who know how to end slavery—the people who have experienced this degradation. **Tonight**, we commit to slavery prevention that is rooted in the wisdom and experience of workers, trafficking survivors, and affected communities. When the seder has ended, we will not return to how it has been "on all other nights." We commit to bringing the lessons of this seder into our actions tomorrow, the next day, and every day to come.

INNOVATION UPDATE FROM IST BELIERS

American Commuters Get a Low-Cost Shared Ride

The days of hailing a cab and searching for change are coming to a halt. Today's commuters can schedule and pay for cabs and ride-shares from their mobile devices. Via, a ride-sharing app which launched in 2012 offers on-demand shared rides driven only by licensed taxi drivers. Book a ride through the free iOS or Android app, and the algorithms match you with a "Via-cle" already headed your way with up to five other passengers. So far, the service is available in parts of Chicago and New York City.

For New York City users, rides cost \$5 plus tax if prepaid or \$7 plus tax, if not prepaid, and is charged automatically to a credit card or commuter benefits debit card. The rides pick you up on the nearest corner of a street that flows in the direction of your destination and drops you off within a couple of blocks of where you want to go. The company reports that the average wait time for a Via-cle is five minutes. Users get an estimate of pickup time before booking and can use the app to track the van's progress.
