

at 11:30 AM. Professor Eisen will present about his newest book, Seeking the Hiding God: A Personal Theological Essay.

Eisen is one of the world's leading scholars on modern Jewish thought and has held faculty positions at Standford, Tel Aviv, and Columbia. Throughout his uniquely impactful career, Eisen wrote and taught about the development of Jewish thought, with a special focus on American Jewry. "I was writing scholarship about other people's Jewish thought for something like forty years," Eisen explains, "but I always somehow avoided facing the questions of what I actually believe."

This book lays out Eisen's beliefs and his ongoing open exploration of his own faith in God, and his open exploration is fueled and enriched by his unique experiences with and insights into Judaism through secular academia, The Jewish Theological Seminary, Jewish organizations, and synagogues.

Through his various teaching positions, publications, and Chancellorship of JTS, Eisen has significantly influenced the development of American Jewry. He has also been a mentor and friend to me and to other rabbis – a great source of inspiration, courage, and wisdom when we have needed it most. For those who have heard Professor Eisen present in the past, he speaks with clarity, honesty, and an incredible depth and breadth of Jewish knowledge, perspective, and experience. Please take advantage of this opportunity to discuss faith and God with Professor Eisen; all who attend will walk away from this conversation with a greater appreciation for how we can incorporate God into and access holiness in our lives.

PASSOVER ...

Kashrut for Pesah

Following is a summary of the decisions of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards (CJLS) of the Rabbinical Assembly pertaining to Passover foods, dishes, and utensils. *Kosher le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your rabbi.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniyot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and

מכירת חמץ Sell Your *Hametz*

An integral part of the pre-Passover planning involves the selling of one's *hametz*. According to Jewish law, we should rid ourselves – for the duration of Passover – of all *hametz* food and utensils which have been used over the course of the year. We follow the custom of selling our *hametz* and utensils to a non-Jew. In this manner, the Biblical injunction regarding *hametz* is respected.

The procedure is simple. Kindly complete the form below and return it to me in the synagogue office or reach out to me by phone or email.

It is customary to make a donation along with selling your *hametz*.

Let me take this opportunity, while well in advance, to wish you and yours an enjoyable and happy Passover.

peas; however, string beans are permitted). The CJLS has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example: corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult a member of the clergy for guidance in the use of these products.

PERMITTED FOODS: A. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (These juices are often clarified with *kitniyot* which are **not** listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a *kosher le-Pesah* label); wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

B. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen) require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased during Pesah: milk, butter, juices, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

C. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if **purchased prior to Pesah**: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt; pepper, natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above); milk; butter; cottage cheese; frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives).

D. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a *kosher le-Pesah* label.

MEDICINE: Since *hametz* binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: if the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult the clergy. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah*, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil. Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

A. EARTHENWARE (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered.

However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

B. *METAL* (wholly made of metal) UTENSILS USED IN FIRE (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

C. OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be put through the self-cleaning cycle according to the manufacturer's instructions. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then two cups of water should be placed inside. Then turn the oven on until one cup of water has boiled away. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot by kashered for Pesah.

D. *GLASSWARE*: Drinking glasses require only a thorough scrubbing before Pesah, or putting them through a dishwasher.

Glass cookware: There is a difference of opinion as to whether this item must be kashered. One opinion is that it must be kashered. After a thorough cleansing, there should be water boiled in it, which will overflow the rim. The other opinion is that only a thorough cleansing is required. *Glass bakeware*, like metal bakeware, may not be kashered.

E. *DISHWASHER*: After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, the drain/filter should be emptied and cleaned, and a full cycle with detergent should be run.

F. *ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES*: If the parts that come into contact with hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)

G. *TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS*: If used with hametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.

H. *KITCHEN SINK*: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

I. HAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS: Non-Passover dishes, pots, and hametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Message from Dr. Michael Schatz, Principal JFGRS

This *Bulletin* we are pleased to profile another pair of Religious School teacher and *madricha*.

"Morah Dvora" Debbie Greenberg started teaching at Har Zion in 1988, and has been teaching our youngest learners, up to second grade (Bet) until now! Debbie grew up in the Main Line area and graduated from the



former Akiba Hebrew Academy (now Barrack). She graduated from Widener University with a teaching degree, but had been teaching in other Hebrew schools during college. Har Zion was able to offer her full-time hours between nursery school and religious school when it ran in two shifts, five days a week! When her children were little, she left the preschool to take care of them, but kept teaching Hebrew school. Sara Cohen, our Education Director Emerita, helped Debbie by supporting her pursuit of a Master of Arts in Jewish Education at Gratz College.

After her children were all in school, Debbie went back to teaching nursery school at Temple Beth Hillel-Beth El, but all through has remained part of the JFGRS faculty. Some of Debbie's fondest memories are seeing her little students all grown up, some of them even returning as parents of students! She recalled that in her early years at Har Zion, she taught the children of past presidents Steve Chopnick and Jeff Blum, and those children came to her wedding as special "young guests!" She has only taught children as old as second grade, because she "loves to see their skills in Hebrew reading develop. They are excited about it and I can see my impact. The little ones really enjoy being in religious school. They have fun and say that they love coming."

Outside of her work, Debbie loves to read, garden, and work out. She has two cats, three grown sons and one new daughterin-law. All the boys worked at Har Zion at some point, two in the day camp, and one in the religious school as a madrich and later madregot specialist.

As the Noreen Cook Center for Early Childhood Education excitedly opens enrollment for the 2025-2026 school year, I am deeply grateful for the many wonderful classrooms, events, and programs we have had success with this year. I am especially proud of the Lundy Inclusion Initiative that is currently in its sophomore year.



The Initiative created the Director of Student Services position which is held by Missie Pludo. Missie's role is multifaceted as she works with private and county therapists, teachers, parents, and students. We are committed to continuing to evolve and shape our program with the help of the Lundy Fund to best meet the needs of our students. Missie has joined the Matan Institute to further her education and I am excited for her to bring back new ideas, understanding, and insights that will benefit our school. Below, Missie shares about her experience.

Here at the NCCECE every single child is treated as an individual and our teachers work very hard every single day to ensure that each one gets exactly what they need to be the best little person they can be. We are fortunate to have the Lundy Inclusion Initiative to help meet every child where they are and keep everyone safe in an environment that supports equity for all.

In the middle of January, I had the opportunity to attend the Matan Institute in New York. Matan is dedicated to disability inclusion in the Jewish community. The Matan Institute hosted a conference focused on advancing inclusive teaching practices within the Jewish world. The event gathered educators, advocates, and community leaders to discuss strategies for creating environments that support the needs of all learners.

I will be part of a year-long mentor program to learn and improve the practices in the NCCECE to support every type of learner. The goal is to make sure that inclusion happens by design and not by afterthought. The Lundy Inclusion Program, which (continued on page 11)

classroom. She is a ninth grader at Harriton High School, and a product of Har Zion, including the NCCECE, day camp, religious school, and became a Bat Mitzvah. She is the third out of her family of four siblings to be a madrich or madricha at JFGRS, and is excited to follow the path forged by Arielle and Jordan, and we hope Jonathan, a sixth grader, will follow her in a few years. Amelia's parents are Israeli-born, and she still has two grandparents in Israel, where she has visited at least ten times. In the summer, Amelia has gone to Camp Weeguahic, and has traveled and spent time at the beach. She is active in the Tzofim, the Israeli Scouts that have a local troop. Scouting is very common in Israel and a huge part of many teens' social life. Her group is made up of Israeli-Americans, and they meet every Sunday. They enjoy games, Israeli culture, and Amelia has attended a seminar to be a counselor in Texas. In her troop, she is the oldest Hanicha, or camper. After 9th grade you can be a madricha, which is a peer leader or counselor. Amelia shared that, "Mostly they try to get us to speak in Hebrew."

Amelia's favorite memory of religious school is music class with Alex, and singing in the children's choir. At Harriton, her favorite subject is math, and she is involved in soccer and the debate team. She has been involved in theater as well, as part of Wolf Pack. As a madricha in religious school, Amelia has learned about how to handle situations with the children, especially the talkative ones, and has learned about various behavior issues. She also recalls that she has helped to teach some Hebrew, including that the letter "Hay" is silent at the end of a word!

I hope you have enjoyed getting to know some of our JFGRS staff who are so devoted to our Har Zion children and to Jewish learning!

The key topics during my time spent working at the Matan Institute were:

Sensory Processing Disorders - the importance of understanding SPD and how it affects individuals in educational and communal settings as well as practical strategies for recognizing and accommodating sensory needs to ensure all participants feel safe and comfortable.

Creating Welcoming Spaces – discussions emphasized the need for intentional design and programming to foster inclusivity and tools and techniques for adapting spaces to meet diverse sensory, emotional, and physical needs.

The conference provided actionable insights and resources to empower educators to create environments that respect and honor the diversity of their learners. Participants left inspired to implement the strategies discussed and to foster inclusive, welcoming spaces for all members of the community.

I am excited to bring all that I learn back to our NCCECE community.




