

October also saw a visit of students and chaperones from Whitwell, TN. We were so happy to have them here after a long hiatus due to COVID. Our 20-year relationship with the students and citizens of Whitwell is a treasure.

A new Shabbat and Festival prayer book, *Siddur Lev Shalom*, was introduced this past fall. We thank the Green-Yudenfriend family for their gift which allowed us to acquire these prayer books. The gift was made in lovingly memory of Minya & Herb Yudenfriend.

We welcomed Rabbi Ira Flax, a familiar figure to our Har Zion community, in a new role. He will lend support to the congregation for pastoral care and life cycle events as our Chaplain. Rabbi Flax continues to teach at all levels of our lifelong learning. He will also occasionally deliver sermons on Shabbat.

Our Centennial Celebration, chaired by Nancy & Michael Grossman and Andrea & Ron Robbins started off with the beautiful installation of Cantor Herman. Thank you to co-chairs Jane & Irv Herling, Peggy & Joe Carver, and Samantha & David Mizrachi, and their committee. We look forward to the Birthday Bash, November 24, 2024, the Special Guest Scholar, February 23, 2025, and the Ultimate Celebration, May 18, 2025.

This year saw the implementation of the Lundy Inclusion Initiative. This is a unique intra-professional program that brings therapists and licensed professional services directly to our NCCECE families. This was made possible by a generous donation from the estate of Marvin Lundy. These expert consultants work with our staff to support our families' and students' needs appropriately. These funds also support the Madregot program of inclusive education in the Jane Fishman Grinberg Religious School.

Our world changed on October 7, 2023 with the Hamas attacks in Israel. In response to the horrors, we began to develop ways to support Israel and our community. We re-established our Israel Affairs committee, now chaired by Rachel Wachs. With support and contributions from all facets of our congregation we provided two generators to needed communities, warm jackets and tents for IDF soldiers, personal care items for displaced Israeli citizens, and many other large and small needed items. We heard from congregants who have visited and volunteered in Israel. We have hosted programs with Israeli volunteer, government, and military leaders, as well as survivors of the terrorist attacks and parents whose daughter was murdered on October 7. Rabbi Haaz and Rabbi Flax have delivered powerful, thoughtful and moving sermons each Shabbat. In the coming months, we will continue to support Israel and address the anti-Semitism that is happening around us.

A lot has taken place this past year at Har Zion but we are not finished yet. We continue to strive to make Har Zion Temple a place of warmth, learning, prayer, and belonging, with a sense of community for all our members. As the Centennial Celebration theme states: Let's Honor Our Past, Celebrate Our Present, and Inspire our Future."

Message from Cantor Herman

So here we are once again in the wondrous glory that is SPRING (late March as I write this)! The poet E. E. Cummings always springs (pun intended) to mind this time of year, from my high school junior year American Lit class:

in Just – spring

when the world is mud-luscious... and puddle-wonderful... and the goat-footed balloonman whistles far and weeee!

I often think of Jerusalem in the springtime, with the blossoming almond and olive trees on every street, their amazing perfumescent wafting past as you walk through the neighborhoods....

There are certain *brachot* (blessings) that one is encouraged to recite upon experiencing the wonders of nature. This can truly create a wonderful moment – of connecting our awe of the beauty of nature to something larger, and of expressing a deep spiritual gratitude.

We have brachot that one recites upon seeing lightning or hearing thunder, seeing a rainbow, experiencing an earthquake, seeing a shooting star, seeing the ocean or mountains.... A bracha generally praises God (which I sometimes prefer to call "The Eternal") for being the source of what we are experiencing, for having a mysterious, divine purpose behind all of creation, and simply helps us to connect wonder and beauty to Him/Her/ It. I would like to share two brachot that are very useful in the springtime; I've already used them both this year - standing near my house, siddur in hand. The first is a blessing specifically for flowering trees (technically for flowering fruit trees, while in bloom but before bearing fruit), said ideally but not necessarily during the Jewish month of Nisan: Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech HaOlam, shelo chisar ba-olamo davar, uvara vo briyot tovot v'ilanot tovim, l'hanot bahem b'nei adam – Blessed are You God ... for creating good creatures and trees, and giving humankind pleasure with them. The other bracha is more general, and may be used at various times throughout the year; it is recited upon seeing exceptionally beautiful trees, fields, or even people: Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech HaOlam, shekacha lo ba-olamo -Blessed are You Eternal One ... who created such beauty in the world.

And while spring often marks new beginnings, this spring marks for me the near-end of my first calendar year at Har Zion. It's been such a wonderful year for my family and me - we already feel very much at home here. The NCCECE (pre-school) has been amazing for my two kids; much gratitude to Sandi Toben and all of the fantastic teachers – thank you for so masterfully helping us raise our kids! Also much, much gratitude to all of the staff here at HZT – you've made me feel incredibly welcome and comfortable - I truly love coming to work, thanks to all of you. And to our congregants - some of whom I see every week at Shabbat services, and all the others that I'm slowly but surely getting to know – we've only just begun! We're just getting warmed up! There's so, so, much more to come in our journey together – more music, more spirituality, more community, more learning. Ritual Matters

Message from **Dr. Ely Levine**, Scholar-in-Residence and Ritual Coordinator

As Yom HaAtzma'ut approaches, we have been living through seven months of aftermath from the October 7 catastrophe.

Langston Hughes taught us what happens to a dream deferred. But what happens to a

dream achieved? Nearly 150 years ago, Naftali Imber wrote the poem that was to become the anthem of the Zionist Movement and then of the State of Israel: *Hatikva*, 'The Hope.'"Our Hope is not yet lost | The Hope that is 2000 years old."

There is some irony in using this song as the anthem of the actual nation that was hoped for. It is, indeed, a delightful irony! A Jewish homeland in Israel is not just a hope anymore. So what do we do with all that hope once the hope has been fulfilled? Of course, we continue to hope for – to pray for – Israel's survival and security. But I think we can go farther.

We learn from American history that there is difference between ideals and reality. The United States was founded on high-minded principles of Enlightenment philosophy: consent of the governed, equal rights based on shared humanity, rule of law. As Martin Luther King Jr. continues to remind us through his most famous speech, the United States has not yet lived up to its creed that all are created equal.

Similarly, in Israel's Declaration of Independence, ideals were set forth that Israel will "foster the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; it will be based on freedom, justice and peace as envisaged by the prophets of Israel; it will ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants irrespective of religion, race or sex; it will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, language, education and culture; it will safeguard the Holy Places of all religions; and it will be faithful to the Charter of the United Nations."

As in American history, Israel's legislature and courts have determined that the lofty proclamations of the Declaration of Independence do not have actual legal weight. In most cases, it has been security concerns that have blocked these ideals. It is true that it is hard to live up to one's ideals in the face of threats and danger: is any of us really our best person while under stress?

On the other hand, while it is quite easy to imagine an ideal world when everything is perfect, we encode our ideals into documents like a Declaration of Independence for the hard times, not the easy times. We need Israel to secure its borders and recover the hostages while remaining true to its ideals. When we communally recite the Prayer for the State of Israel, let us consider what it means that Israel is the "beginning of our redemption." Let us think in specific terms about what it means to ask God to "guide its leaders and advisors with Your light and Your truth." When we join together to sing *Hatikva*, let us find ways to keep an *ayin l'tziyon tzofiya*, an eye looking toward Zion – our dreams, our ideals. We can encourage Israel to live up to its creed so that all of Israel's citizenry can enjoy being a free people in its land.

Kabbalat Shabbat with Saunders House Residents

Andy Coren and Maxine Waxman continue the Sisterhood tradition begun by Doris Grossmann (z"l) in 1988 providing a Kabbalat Shabbat service every Friday afternoon at Saunders House, a long-term care and rehab facility in Wynnewood. Our Kabbalat Shabbat services provides an opportunity for Jewish residents (and non-Jewish residents who choose to join us) to gather as a group. It brings them a sense of community that they don't otherwise have.

In addition to providing Kabbalat Shabbat services, we celebrate all the Jewish holidays in style. Annually, we host a festive musical Rosh Hashanah luncheon and a Passover Seder led by Hazzan Vogel. Additionally, we have special snacks, decorations and songs for our other holidays including; Sukkot, Hanukkah, Tu B'Shvat, Purim and Israel Independence Day.

Singing songs from our elderly residents' pasts sparks their memory and recall. Our group shares memories from their lives – even as far back as their youth. Remarkably, they remember the prayers and their accompanying tunes. On a weekly basis, the people in our group tell us how grateful they are that we come, lead the service and spend time with them. They look forward to our gathering and feel that this is the highlight of their week.

In actuality, this group means a lot to us as well. There is no comparison to the sense of fulfillment when we leave Saunders House each Friday.

We are honored to continue this tradition on behalf of Har Zion's Sisterhood – *L'Chaim*.

Message from Dr. Michael Schatz, Principal JFGRS

The post-Pesach spring months bring us near the end of another year of Jewish learning and living in the Jane Fishman Grinberg Religious School. Our children have thrived in our enriching program, learning, exploring, creating, davening, singing, dancing, sharing and, did I say, LEARNING?!



The spring months have included our

second annual Dalet Museum of Jewish Family heirlooms, which included a very special Sefer Torah written by the great, great grandfather of one of our students who was the Shammash of Har Zion when we opened 100 years ago! We celebrated Purim with a day of fun activities, we held our biennial Keiser-Wilf Religious School Pesach Seder, helping our children learn the many songs, prayers and blessings of the Haggadah to share at their families' sedarim. We joyfully participated in the installation of Cantor Herman with a special song. Aleph students led a Shabbat"seder", showing the *brachot* they know, and using the kiddush cup and candlesticks they made. The Gimel class learned *Birkat HaMazon*, and recited it beautifully at a special dinner. And we did much, much more each day of our school.

In the coming weeks, our Bet students will receive their first siddur at a special dinner, our Gan, Aleph and Bet children and their families will participate in a JRA food distribution, all of our lower school children will participate in a Zimriyah-Rikudiah, a song and dance festival celebrating Yom Ha'Atzmaut and the 76th anniversary of the founding of the modern State of Israel. We culminate our year with a closing program during which our Dalet students receive their own Tikkun, a special book for practicing Torah chanting. Hay students will receive a Chumash, and Vav students a siddur, each with their names embossed. During the quiet summer months, we hope that our JFGRS families will have some relaxing family time, and that our children will be preparing for another great year of Jewish learning. Our NCCECE graduates will be welcomed into the religious school, our rising eighth graders will join with other Jewish teens from neighboring Lower Merion synagogues in the LMAHH high

school on Tuesday nights, and everyone in between will be continuing in our outstanding school program, building more skills and values onto the base they have acquired.


