Talmud with Rabbi Sarra Lev, PhD

The rabbinic prohibitions against shaming another often lie in stark contrast to stories of shaming and competition among those very same rabbis. This class asks the overarching question – what is the Talmud trying to tell us about shame/shaming?

Rabbi Lev is an associate professor of rabbinic texts (Talmud and Midrash) at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. She has taught adult education in many contexts including synagogues, Jewish Alive & American, the Feminist Center of the American Jewish Congress, Me'ah, and Bat Kol: A Feminist House of Study, which she co-founded. She delights in teaching.

Archaeology and the Bible: What do we know? What can we do?

Archaeology has the potential to teach us a lot about people who lived long ago. It also has the potential to be misused to confirm preconceived notions about the past. Since the Bible is such a polarizing document, archaeology has been mustered by some seeking to "prove" the Bible and by others seeking to discredit the Bible. Dr. Ely Levine, who earned his doctorate in Biblical studies and archaeology, will speak about his experience in the field, and how it informs conversations between these two fields.

more details on some of the work being done in the U.S. and around the world at the local, national, and international levels, and share more of her personal perspective as a young woman in this field.

Author - Itzhak Brook

Author of the book "*In the Sands of Sinai, a Physician's Account of the Yom Kippur War*"

A presentation to your Jewish community about the historical perspectives of the 1973 Yom Kippur War, and its long-term effects on the Israeli society and the peace process, as well as my personal experiences as a medic in the Six-Day War and a battalion physician in Yom Kippur War. My lecture includes discussion of the challenges of preserving one's humanity and ethical values during wartime; caring for wounded enemy soldiers; dealing with fear, anxiety and PTSD; religious beliefs' effects on coping with the war; and experiencing the painful cost of war.
