Ritual Matters

Message from **Dr. Ely Levine**, Scholar-in-Residence and Ritual Coordinator



While I was a graduate student studying archaeology, I was introduced to the *Annales* School of historiography and one of its most prolific members, Fernand Braudel. Pushing back against the view of history as a series of big, world-changing events (wars, conquests, coronations, decrees, etc.), they sought to describe the underlying, longer-term processes that moved the world. These *longue-durée* processes took place over centuries, or even millennia, and interacted with medium-range (decades-long) processes and also the more sudden, more traditionally seen events. It is because of the *Annales* school that we understand the climate changes of the past that led to mass-migrations and changes to the flow of rivers that led to the fall of civilizations.

Similarly, we can look our lives (and especially our Jewish lives) from the perspective of the big, life-changing moments like births, deaths, weddings, etc., or of the annual rhythms of the holidays. We can count the days until Shabbat. Or we can try to see the long-term, underlying processes that permeate all the others. For example, we can track our overall health and mobility. We can look at our growth as marked on the doorframe, or at our growth in learning.

It is not that one is better or more important than the others, it is just that the longer term is so often neglected. It is mostly imperceptible as it is happening, and we do not have words to describe things moving that slowly. So these processes are mostly unmentioned background in our thoughts.

What if we tried to move them up to the front of our consciousness? It is likely, for the reasons I just described, that we would end up thinking of them as frequent minor events rather than a continuous process (like the height marks on the doorframe), but as we learn in calculus, that is a reasonable approximation. But how would this inform our understandings of events? Would we understand our successes better? Would we be as surprised when we fall (literally or figuratively)?

One result, I hope, might be the appreciation of the little things, the normal, the everyday. Every day with our loved ones becomes an opportunity. Every meal is not just a palette of flavors, but a dose of nutrients. And it is the product of dozens, maybe hundreds, of people, whose job is to support your nutrition, and countless other factors like weather that allows for that food to grow. All of those background details can be overwhelming. And that is good, I think, because overwhelming is evidence of the Divine.


Women Rabbis as Change Agents | The Rabbinical Assembly

EDUCATION . . .

Message from Dr. Michael Schatz, Principal, JFGRS

Allow me to introduce to our Har Zion community the Shinshinim this year. **Shinshinim** are Israeli high school graduates giving a year of service (*Shnat Sherut*: hence *Shinshinim*) to the Jewish People by working in communities around the world. Dan Sagiv and Noya Gross arrived in September and are with us on both Sunday and Tuesday, helping our children learn about Israel by engaging with peers just a little bit older. During the course of each week, Noya and Dan teach our Gan and Aleph children about Israel and introduce them to some simple Hebrew words through games and play. They lead the middle school in a *rega shel ivrit*, or moment of Hebrew, and go into the classrooms for middle school *kehillah*, or community building time. They also work with our elementary students one class at a time, partnering with the teachers and bringing their own creativity, leadership and first-hand experience to impart *ahavat yisrael*, the love of the People, Land and State of Israel, to our students. Throughout the year, Noya and Dan will have some special Sunday afternoon youth-group and scouting type activities with different age groups of our children. I know the entire JFGRS community joins Rabbi Shawn and me in welcoming Noya and Dan!



